Reading in school How do we teach reading?

- Guided reading
- Shared reading
- Individual reading
- Reading across the curriculum
- Intervention groups

Shared Reading

- Teachers read texts aloud with the class.
- Strategies for reading are explicitly taught
- Children read together to develop appropriate fluency.
- Teachers question the children to extend their understanding and raise awareness of key features from the text.

Guided Reading

- Each week all children will have this quality time with the teacher.
- Children read and discuss a text in a small group.
- We use a consistent approach across year groups
- Guided Reading gives them the opportunity to apply skills taught through Shared Reading.
- Reading is followed by questions to develop understanding
- The focus is linked to the **shared reading** focus for that week.
- Texts are chosen to be challenging.

Individual reading

- The reading books are levelled to help support progression in reading skills.
- Each child has a reading record card to record reading at home
- Children should be developing independence in completing their record card – teachers will check regularly.
- Reading books, and record cards, need to be brought to school every day.
- There will be time each week for children to read and change their books.

Reading across the curriculum

- Teaching of reading is not limited to English sessions.
- Reading information texts, on-screen and in books, extends learning in all areas of learning.
- Reading strategies taught in English lessons are developed further through cross-curricular links.
- Reading skills support learning in all areas of the curriculum.

Assessing progress and Bench Marking

- Children's individual progress is assessed as part of the on-going process of guided reading and response to reading comprehension activities.
- We avoid moving children to harder reading levels until they are showing confidence in their reading accuracy and comprehension within their current level.



Top Tips on how to support your child with reading

Top Tip 1: Provide Reading Material

- Try to ensure that there is a wide range of reading material in your home
- Reading is not just about story books, in fact many younger children enjoy reading factual information just as fiction
- Visit the library regularly to make sure your child sees lots of different types of books, this way they can then decide what they like and don't like
- Newspapers and comics also provide good reading material, a great source of free reading material can be found in leaflets and magazines

TOP TIP 2: Read Aloud

- Be a top role model for reading, make sure your child sees you read regularly and most importantly let your child see that you gain pleasure and information from what you read
- Read out loud to your child books, nursery rhymes, poems, newspaper & magazine articles, text messages, food labels, recipes, road signs – pretty much anything that's close to hand
- This will encourage your child to look for words and understand their importance

TOP TIP 3: Ask Questions

Ask questions about the story as you read it:

- What is the story about?
- Who is this character?
- Why did they do that?
- What do you think will happen next?
- Talk to your child about the words used in the story
- What does that word mean?
- Why do you think the author used that word?
- Can you think of another word that means the same thing?

To support you with this there is a list of questions to ask your child while they read in your pack

TOP TIP 4: Go Online

- Don't forget the power of technology
- There are hundreds of Apps and good online quality reading sites where children can play games and read different types of material.
- Online games can support phonics and spelling

TOP TIP 5: Make Space

- Although its great to read anywhere and at anytime
- Children enjoy knowing that there is a special time when you share reading with them – for many children this might be before bedtime but it can be at any time that suits you and your child
- Choose a special place or a regular time when you and your child can read together

TOP TIP 6: Make it Fun!

- Try to make sure that reading does not become a chore, make it fun so that you and your child can look forward to it
- Take it in turns to read a line each, put on silly voices when reading aloud, add a bit of drama to stories and act out what's happening or dress up in costumes
- Try reading in an unusual place, like reading under the covers using torches, make a tent with sheet and pillows and read in the tent
- Remember not every child finds reading easy and not all children learn at the same pace but by following these top tips you are giving your child a head start to gaining a positive attitude to reading!
